Sarah Ann Smith will share how she works from design concepts to construction of her quilts when she presents her trunk show, "How Did She Do That?" for Colorado Quilting Council at 10 a.m. Saturday, December 4 via Zoom. She'll explain her collage technique using prefused fabric to create realistic portraits and landscapes that she then enhances with intense freemotion quilting. Sarah says of her work:

"Color, line, texture, rhythm and movement, imagery and stories inspire me. As a child, I wanted to be an artist and admired those who could draw. My path to art has been circuitous and unusual. As a young child, I lived in Spain, Thailand and Argentina. Shortly after my sixth birthday, we returned to the United States to live. That year a neighbor girl made an apron for my favorite doll, sparking a fascination with fiber that continues to this day. My path to art included being a legislative assistant to a U.S. Congressman then a U.S. Foreign Service officer for nearly 15 years, sewing for an interior designer, then becoming a mom

and launching my own small business."

Having been a professional vagabond for her first four decades, Sarah's art now celebrates the home of her soul that she found in midcoast

She is author of ThreadWork Unraveled (American Quilter's Society, 2009). She has publication credits for articles in magazines including Quilting Arts, Machine Quilting Unlimited, Germany's Professional Patchwork and QuiltMania. Her art has been exhibited in the United States, Europe, Australia and New Zealand. She's appeared on Quilting Arts TV and The Quilt Show, and produced a video

workshop through Interweave Press. Sarah has been teaching across the United States since 2004.

She enjoys teaching as an opportunity to share her passion to create and to design textile art and surface pattern. She will teach her "Collage the Garden" workshop for CQC from 1-4 p.m. Sundays, December 5 and 12 via Zoom. Using an image provided by Sarah, students will create a working pattern/guide sheet and will learn to select a range of fabrics plus best ways to apply fusible to those fabrics. Students will select from one of two images provided by Sarah: a pink water lily or an orange day lily though she says changing up the colors is fine. She explains how to do that in the workshop supply list. Students will learn about design, value, shading and shape. Time permitting, Sarah will discuss thread coloring and quilting the collages.

CQC October 2021 Board Meeting Minutes Submitted by Recording Secretary Betty Andrews

Laural Hoppes, President called the members present. Laural announced there were six members identified for the COC Steering Committee with one additional member to be identified for the new member slot. Members are Penny Christensen, Carol Cook, Laural Hoppes, Patty Joy, Dawn Mills, and Mary Rush. This group's purpose is to perform the duties of president and 2nd vice president for programs in the interim until these positions can be filled on a permanent basis. These duties include meetings and completing budget functions. General membership meetings and writing the newsletter article would be performed by a past president or Hall of Fame member. Penny Christensen will answer emails coming to the council and Kaila Mills will handle Zoom connections for the board meetings, general meetings and workshops. Chris Jacques will schedule speakers and handle contracts to keep programs going. A discussion that it should be an elected position to review contracts was held and will be determined prior to the general meeting. Andrea Coyle will handle advertising, eblasts and the CQC website. There was an extensive discussion on functions and membership of this committee including addition of Chris Jacques in her role of organizing programs, person(s) who had not previously served in a board position and new members to the council. Eblasts and meeting announcements will continue asking for volunteers for president and 2nd vice president for programs until these positions are filled. Efforts made to recruit for these positions over the last vear were reviewed. It was suggested we review files of new members and persons taking workshops to assist in locating a person for this committee. Chris Jacques asked who would sign contracts for speakers. Laural will continue to do that through the end of the year.

Total expenses for Quilt-A-Fair have not yet been received. Karen reported she will be placing information for Colorado Gives Day in the newsletter. Dawn Mills reported Joyce Taft received \$62.00 as a result of a class action suit against Wells Fargo.

> Carol Cook, librarian, reported 168 books were sold at the Quilt-A-Fair Library Book Sale. All but one checked out book was returned.

Project Warm Hearts, Betsy Stewart, reported that quilt components were found in one of the totes she has not used recently. There are seven finished guilts to distribute, two quilts needing binding, ten quilts needing quilting, three complete quilt top kits, and blocks for another four to six quilt tops. Betsy is sending some of these down with Carol Cook for Fall Retreat for distribution and/or finishing. Betsy is planning on a new block to be published in the January newsletter so that everyone can make blocks to turn in at the January meeting. She'd like to revise the block submission form so that it doesn't require a separate form for each block and instead have a space for number of blocks submitted. She doesn't know if she needs permission to do this but thought she would check.

Hall of Fame, Jean Ruger: Jean has nominees from 2020 and 2021. Ballots were sent to committee members and are back ready for December presentation.

Quilt-A-Fair, Dawn Mills: Dawn reported the fair as a successful weekend with a steady flow of visitors who were able to get into booth space and purchase from vendors. The quilt exhibits from the Rocky Mountain Quilt Museum, the International Quilt Museum in Lincoln, Nebraska, and The National Quilt Museum in Paducah, Kentucky were a hit with the visitors. Karen Brown reported over 150 volunteers assisted with set up, operations, and take down. There were 2,200 visitors reported. There will be a wrap up meeting October 30 and planning for Quilt-A-Fair 2022 will begin

in February. Karen Truesdell reported estimated \$35,349 net income (not final). Special thanks to Kathy and Jerry Gaul for their work on the quilt exhibits, marketing posters, contracts and more.

Quilt Trails Project, Pat Smith reported the Colorado Quilt Trail inventory is well under way. As you can imagine, some buildings are no longer there, some blocks are hard to find, some businesses have moved, and some blocks came down when a building was painted and were never seen again. The good news is that we are finding most trail sites still in place. The following trail inventories are complete

- JeffCo Loop—Golden, Evergreen, Morrison
- Boulder County—Boulder, Lyons, Longmont, Erie
- Denver (temporarily down)
- Englewood/South Broadway
- Littleton

As inventories are completed, they will be updated on the website. We could use some help for points south of Holly's in Centennial including Parker, Castle Rock, Colorado Springs, Fountain, Woodland Park and Divide. Help is also needed to the north in Loveland, Mead and Ft. Collins. Trail locations are posted on the CQC website. Contact Pat Smith at CQCQuiltTrails@gmail.com if you would like to participate in the ongoing inventory.








String Fling and More Adventures with Leaders and Enders by Bonnie K. Hunter

Bonnie Hunter describes herself as a "hopeless scrapaholic" and encourages all quilters to join her in producing a multitude of scrappy quilts. She has devised the Scrap Users System to organize fabric scraps into readily available sizes to make it easier to use them in scrappy quilts. More Adventures with Leaders and Enders (The Kansas City Star Co., 2014) provides in depth information about Bonnie's Scrap User's System. A key element in completing scrappy quilts quicker is the use of leaders and enders. Instead of using a small scrap of fabric (sometimes called a thread bunny, spider, or sew-between) to sew onto when completing a line of chain piecing, Bonnie realized that she could sew two small units together making a two-patch or half-squaretriangle unit. Doing this consistently allows the quilter to complete hundreds of these small units in between sewing blocks for another quilt and, like magic, there are enough sewn units for another photos and detailed block assembly quilt.

Strings are fabric scraps that are too small to be used for other projects, usually between 2" and 34" in width. Strings are sewn randomly onto either paper or fabric foundations and then cut into the size needed for a quilt project. String Fling (The Kansas City Star Co., 2012) provides many tips and tricks for sewing string units efficiently, the advantages of using paper foundations, and how to remove the paper easily. It also includes detailed information about Bonnies's Scrap User System and using leaders and enders. There are 13 quilt projects in the book that utilize units pieced from the standard scrap sizes in addition to the string units. Some of the projects have controlled colored palettes, such as the blue and yellow of Blue Skies or the red, blue and black of Orca Bay. Some projects have an "anything goes" color palette, such as Pineapple Crazy (with 5" blocks) and

More Adventures with Leaders and Enders contains 12 projects with full-color diagrams. Hints on how to piece the quilt parts as leaders and enders are included. It also includes information on creating a pieced backing using orphan blocks and older fabrics that have lost their charm. Many of the projects have surprising color combinations, such as Midnight Flight with its black, purple, cheddar and red palette, and Lazy Sunday with hot pink, orange, green, purple and turquoise palette. Using Bonnie's techniques, I have been able to piece two different king-size quilts while working on other projects. This is a great way to accomplish more and use fabrics leftover from other projects.

Warm-Hearted Woman's Puzzle Current Project Warm Hearts Block

by Betsy Stewart

I've always thought this is a graceful block that can be incorporated into many quilt settings with delightful results. I've also always thought it has a terrible name!

Quilts blocks with this design were included in quilts made as early as the 1850s. Nancy Cabot documented the version we are using in 1934 and 1936 as "Old Maid's Puzzle." Since we know quilting is an ever-expanding and adapting craft, I think we should rename the block the "Warm-Hearted Woman's Puzzle." After all, by making and donating these blocks, you demonstrate you are indeed a warm-hearted woman.

Block Directions

This block finishes at 9" x 9" in the quilt. This means the block you submit should be 9½" x 9½". Make the background from white fabric and the colorful portion of the block from either one print or colored fabric or two complementary fabrics. A variety of print and colored fabrics may be used when making multiple blocks.

Cutting


White fabric:

- Cut one 5%" x 5%" square*
- Cut four 2¾" x 2¾" squares
- Cut two 31/8" x 31/8" squares**

Print/colored fabric:

- Cut one 5%" x 5%" square*
- Cut two 31/8" x 31/8" squares**
- *You may choose to cut 5½" x 5½" squares and trim the half square triangle (HST) units to 5" squares.

**You many chose to cut 31/4" x 31/4" squares and trim the HST units to 234" squares.



Assembly

Step 1: Draw a diagonal line on the wrong side of each white 31/8" square and on the white 5%" square.

Step 2: Place each white 31/8" square right sides together with a print/colored 31/8" square. Place the white 5%" square and the print/colored 5%" square right sides together.

Step 3: Stitch 1/4" away from the drawn diagonal line on both sides of the line on all the 31/8" and 53/8" squares.

Step 4: Cut on the drawn lines.

Step 5: Press the triangles open, pressing the seam toward the print/colored fabric.



At the end of this step, you will have four 2¾" HSTs and two 5" HSTs.

Step 6: Referring to the photo, place a white 2¾" square on the left side and a 2¾" HST on the right side. Note the position of the print/colored triangle next to the white 2¾" square. Place these pieces right sides together and sew. Press open, pressing the seam toward the print/col-



ored triangles. At the end of this step, you will have four units measuring 2¾" x 5".

Step 7: Referring to the photo, place two 2¾" x 5" units from Step 6 so the print/ colored points meet in the center. Join the units. Reduce bulk by swirling the seams open at the intersection of the points, then press the seams in opposite directions. Repeat with the remaining two 2¾"



x 5" units. This will yield two 5" x 5" squares.

Step 8: Referring to the photo, arrange the two 5" HSTs and the two 5" squares from Step 7 as shown. The print/colored points of the 5" HSTs should meet in the center. Join the top 5" unit from Step 7 and the top 5" HST. Repeat for the bottom 5" HST triangle and the remaining 5" unit from Step 7. Join the two rows. Press



the seam to one side, or to reduce bulk, swirl the seam and press open.

The block is complete. It should measure

If you'd like to piece your blocks into a quilt top, the size for Project Warm Hearts quilts is about 40" x 50".
