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Diane Harris Invites CQCers to Get Their Jingle On

Diane Harris' "Jingle Bells" trunk show will get Colorado Quilting Council members in a merry mood just in time for the holidays. She describes the show as "a happy celebration of the most wonderful time of the year."

The show will include 36 quilts, large and small, pieced and appliquéd, modern and traditional — a little something for everyone. Diane says of the quilts:

"These aren't just red and green quilts. There are inspired color recipes of all sorts. Soon you'll be planning a quilt of your own or maybe one for every family member. Come get your jingle on!"

Diane is a quilt designer, speaker and teacher. After 11 years as an editor for *Quiltmaker* magazine, she formed Stash Bandit through which she presents trunk shows and workshops for quilters. She is passionate about making scrap quilts and creating original designs. She says she never met a fabric she didn't like. She uses scrap quilts to help others understand color, design and quilting techniques.

Her work is regularly featured in national publications, which helps her spread the word about Stash Bandit. "It's always a happy day if your quilt makes the cover," she says. "That never gets old."

She has described her work with *Quiltmaker* as a dream job. She wrote articles on quilting, pattern instructions and product reviews, and she shot how-to videos. And she worked with the website.

"I was the online voice of *Quiltmaker*. In the early days, we were figuring out what it meant for a business to be online along with everyone else. It was exciting, exhausting and fun."

Diane's Dresden Plate video for *Quiltmaker* has logged 175,000 views. While with the magazine, she was one of the editors who promoted it by giving trunk shows of quilts featured on its pages.

"I loved doing that, and I got good feedback from quilt groups," she says. "So when my time with *Quiltmaker* ended, since I'd been making quilts for 30 years, I started Stash Bandit

and began sharing my own quilts in trunk shows."

She'd been teaching some over the years so added classes to her lineup.

"Writing for a pattern magazine is a form of teaching so it seemed only natural," she says.

Diane works as a brand ambassador for HQ Stitch by Hand-iQuilter and manages social media for the brand.

She doesn't publish her patterns though some are available through various magazines and a few are available for free on her website: <https://stashbandit.net>. She prefers to teach students how to create their own unique quilts.

Diane will teach her "Baby Windmills" workshop for CQC members from 1-3:30 p.m. Sunday December 6 via Zoom. See page 5 for information and page 4 to register.



Making Quilting Memories

2020 has been a year of challenge. We've been through stay-at-home and safer-at-home directives. Our children and grandchildren are learning virtually, and those of us who are teachers, have been teaching from home, also virtually. Restaurants have closed then reopened with outdoor and/or limited seating. We're staying in touch with each other on computers, smart phones and tablets. Appointments, whether doctor visits or haircuts, require we be scanned for our temperature then asked to answer questions before entering.

Our quilting foremothers faced tough times. When dust ravaged eastern Colorado, women hunkered down at home to avoid the illness caused by the foul air. Among those was Lula Reineke Evans, whose ranch straddled the Colorado-Nebbraska border. Sandra Dallas, in her book *The Quilt That Walked to Golden*, quotes Lula on her response to a dust storm as recorded in notes about the Colorado Springs Pioneer Museum quilt collection. Lula wrote:

"I pulled the shades and brought out these materials and started this quilt. I've always enjoyed making quilts for the joy, pleasure, happiness and contentment they gave me."

Like Lula, many of us have turned to quilting this year. CQC has worked to accompany our members by finding new ways to be a statewide community of more than 500 quiltmakers. These efforts became necessary just two months into my term as your CQC president. I sometimes ask myself if this is what I signed up for — virtual meetings? online workshops? hundreds of emails?

My answer: Not really. It is what happened, and like each of you, I've adjusted. I want an end to the pandemic, and I am grateful for all I've learned in the last nine months.


Diane Harris to Workshop “Baby Windmills” December 5 via Zoom

Diane will teach a 2.5-hour version of her popular “Baby Windmills” workshop from 1-3:30 p.m. Sunday, December 6 via Zoom. This is a fun, fast and easy project right on time for holiday gift giving. You’ll reduce your stash as Diane leads you in some serious scrap play. She says she’s been making this versatile block for years, continually discovering new ways to use the blocks. She’ll share her examples then help you create a unique quilt. The class will be stress-free. Diane will share some bonus quilt techniques as time allows.

Helen Frost Will Sparkle in January Trunk Show and Workshop

Quilt world icon Helen Frost, who began quilting in 1972 and teaching two years later, says CQC members will have stars in their eyes as they enjoy her trunk show, “Lone Stars: A Galaxy of Quilts,” at 10 a.m. Saturday, January 23, 2021, via Zoom. She’ll present star quilts from the close to 40 years she’s been designing and making them, including some from *All-Star Quilts: 10 Strip-Pieced Lone Star Sparklers* (C&T Publishing, 2010), a book she authored with her mother, Blanche Young. Variations include Touching Stars, Blazing Star, Broken Star, Double Star and more. And Helen will share stories from her years as a quiltmaker, author, teacher, and in her words, “magician.”

Helen will teach her “Lone Star Sparkler” workshop from 1-4 p.m. two consecutive Sundays, January 24 and 31, 2021, via Zoom. You’ll make a diamond dazzler using the strip-piecing technique developed by Helen and her mother, and you’ll learn precision cutting, pinning, sewing and pressing plus painless set-in seams and perfected mitered borders.



Angela Jones to Teach Walking-Foot Quilting

Angela Jones, CQC member and instructor at Hi Fashion Sewing Machines and Quilt Shop in Grand Junction, is adapting her sell-out popular walking-foot class to Zoom for CQC. “Contemporary Sashiko Sampler” Workshop Coming in March



CQC October 2020 Board Meeting Minutes.....Submitted by Recording Secretary Betty Andrews

1st Vice President for Membership Pat Cleaveland called the meeting to order at 6:16 p.m. in the absence of President Laural Hoppes. The meeting was held via Zoom. Twelve members were present: Pat Cleaveland, Dana Jones, Mary Rush, Betty Andrews, Dawn Mills, Nancy Samuels, Carol Cook, Kay Hefner, Sue Keck, Pat MacMillan, Jean Ruger and Betsy Stewart.

Secretary Betty Andrews: Minutes from the September board meeting were sent out for approval. There were no changes. Mary Rush moved approval of the minutes, Sue Keck seconded and all present approved.

Treasurer Mary Rush: Account balances as of September 30, 2020, were: general fund, \$5,125.31; raffle fund, \$6,383.84; Shirley Sanden Fund, \$3,929.03, for total operating funds of \$15,438.18, plus CD, \$10,948.20, and Quilt-a-Fair, \$16,303.15, for a total of \$42,689.53. Mary reminded everyone to use AmazonSmile if shopping on Amazon. Dawn and Dana reminded us of the upcoming Colorado Gives Day. Sue Keck asked that the e-blast include reminders for AmazonSmile and Colorado Gives. She is looking into having CQC designated as a charity with Kroger stores, including King Soopers and City Market.

1st Vice President for Membership Pat Cleaveland: CQC has 536 members. There was a discussion on communicating to the large number of members who renew in January. The consensus was to start with email blasts and move to post-cards as needed.

2nd Vice President for Programs Dana Jones

- Cindy Grisdela will be the October speaker/teacher. Her workshop is full with 25 people and two on a waiting list.
- Diane Harris will be the December speaker/teacher. Registrations for her workshop are beginning to come in. It will be a half-day workshop, "Baby Windmills." Because it is a half day, the fee was reduced to \$40.

Dana has contacted everyone she had scheduled for 2021 to see if they will speak and teach via Zoom. Dana is only scheduling folks who will do so to avoid re-scheduling during the year. Toward committing less money than usual, Dana is reaching out to some Colorado folks to speak and/or teach. It is good visibility for them and cost effective for CQC. Dana is trying new formats in which not every speaker also teaches and vice versa. Dana is scheduling some workshops as multi-session classes. She has been attending via Zoom Global Quilt Connection teacher preview sessions where she's discovering new talent. Dana asked how folks feel about some workshops being weekdays like the 2020 BOM class. People said this is okay. Dana announced the following 2021 programs and workshops: January, Helen Frost; February lecture: Rose Parr.; February workshop: Angela Jones; March, Crystal Wentz; April, TBS; May, Christina Cameli; June, Rita Meyerhoff; July and August, TBS; October, Maria Shell; and December, Beth Ferrier.

Interim Newsletter Editor Dana Jones: Randy Mills has assisted with loading information onto the CQC website as others learn and gain access to the account.

Committee Reports, General Information

Nancy Samuels, Nominations: The 2021 officer election results are: President, Laural Hoppes, 11 votes; 1st Vice President for Membership, Pat Cleaveland, 11 votes; Secretary, Betty Andrews, 11 votes; Treasurer, Mary Rush, 10 votes.

Dawn Mills: Quilt-a-Fair: Penny Christensen won the Quilt-a-Fair Shop Hop for purchasing items from the most participating shops. The Quilt-a-Fair Quilt Show winner will be announced at the October general meeting and the ribbon sent to her. Quilt-a-Fair statistics: 2,186 people visited the Virtual Quilt-a-Fair web pages. Of those, 1,436 visited the shop-hop page and 740 the event's schedule page. Quilt-a-Fair made \$1,800. Dawn thanked Jamie

Tabaka and Dana Jones for making the event possible. An honorarium was sent to Jamie. Dana recommended renewing Jaimie's membership as a thank you.

Finding What You Want in LibraryThing, CQC's Online Search Tool

The CQC Library collection has been entered into an online tool called LibraryThing to provide members with expanded ability to search the catalog. With more than 2,000 items in the library, the ability to search the catalog online makes it easier to find books of interest. Following are tips on how to make the most of this program even if you're a bit computer shy.

Search categories include title; author; publication date; key words, known as *tags*; and comments. The LibraryThing app provides a listing of all items in the CQC Library with a photo of the book or DVD's cover. When members select a book or DVD, LibraryThing displays a page with more information about the item.

Members can access the CQC LibraryThing catalog by clicking the pink "CQC Library" button on the CQC website home page: coloradoquiltingcouncil.com.

Referring to the screen shot of a page of LibraryThing above, here's how to use this online tool to search for books and DVDs:

- Decide if you want to search by title, author, date or other way as indicated in column headings. Click on the triangle next to the column heading you've chosen. For example, see the small triangle next to the Author column heading above. You can toggle this to sort by ascending alphabetical order (A-Z) or descending (Z-A).
- You can enter key words, known as *tags*, into the small search box in the upper right corner of the page. Examples of tags include patchwork, appliqué, baby quilts, art quilts and design. There are several tags displayed for each book. A complete list of the tags used in the CQC library can be displayed by clicking on the tags button, which is fourth from the left near the top of the page.
- Authors' names or book titles can also be entered into the search box. Above, "Anderson" has been entered into the search box, so LibraryThing is displaying books written by Alex Anderson.

Note: There are two search boxes on the page. The smaller search box searches the CQC Library. The larger search box located in the brown header area searches all libraries in LibraryThing, which, while interesting, won't provide the response you're looking for.

Some additional features to know:

- Clicking on a book's title will display more information about the book.
- The Lending column provides information on whether the book is currently checked out and when it is due. The name of the member who has checked out the book is not displayed.

If you find a book or DVD that you'd like to check out, send an email to CQC Librarian Carol Cook at cqclibrary@gmail.com. She will coordinate the possibility of curbside pickup or delivery if you are in the South Denver Metro to Pueblo areas. Otherwise, it is possible to mail items if you are willing to reimburse the postage, which usually is less than \$5.


Vintage Christmas: A Wealth of Block and Quilt Designs Awaits You

Is it beginning to look a lot like Christmas in your neighborhood? Or are you, like many quilters, looking for last-minute inspiration or patterns for quilt projects and gifts? Lori Holt of Bee in My Bonnet Company provides the projects and inspiration you need in her book *Vintage Christmas* (Fat Quarter Shop, 2018). Don't be fooled by the title. This book has a contemporary view of Christmas quilts, using fresh, bright color palettes. There are full-color illustrations of the blocks and projects and clearly written instructions.

Vintage Christmas provides directions for 42 pieced quilt blocks in 6" and 12" sizes. "Vintage Christmas Sampler," pictured on the book's cover, includes all of these blocks, which are a mixture of traditional blocks and one-of-a-kind picture blocks. The blocks are machine pieced, and some include embroidery, rickrack and buttons as finishing touches.

Lori's instructions do not include fabric amounts for each block as she assumes the blocks will be pieced from scraps or a collection of fat quarters. This could be confusing for a novice quilter.

There are settings and instructions for dozens of projects and quilts, which the quilter can personalize by choosing any of the blocks or using the blocks Lori uses. A table-runner design includes 6" and 12" blocks. A mug-mat design, made from just one 6" block, includes a pocket for a straw, spoon or candy cane. Pair it with a mug and hot drink mix for a quick gift for a teacher or co-worker. A placemat design with a utensil pocket and made from one 12" block is another quick gift project.

Pillow designs in two sizes — 12.5" and 18.5" — are good for quick gifts and holiday decorations.

Another section of *Vintage Christmas* provides nine quilt designs incorporating sixteen 6" blocks, nine 12" blocks and a choice of any of four setting rectangles. There are full directions and fabric amounts for these "Two Color Quilts," which finish at 68.5" square. Any of the block designs can be used for these quilts, and the quilter can mix and match the blocks.

Although Lori's examples focus on Christmas color combinations, quilts can be made using some of the more generic blocks, such as stars or flying geese, in other colors combinations to make non-

holiday quilts. These quilts would make great graduation and birthday gifts.

There are 10 other quilt designs using combinations of 6" and 12" blocks. These vary in size from 64.5" x 72.5" up to 90.5" square. Two designs for sampler quilts are provided, including "Vintage Christmas Sampler" and "Christmas Eve," a quilt made with 25 blocks. There are three designs for row quilts using a combination of blocks. Lori's "Bringing Home the Christmas Tree" will be a favorite. It includes patterns for larger "Car with Christmas Tree" and "Christmas Tree" blocks. These quilt patterns include fabric requirements needed for background, sashing, borders, binding and backing, but not the blocks since the blocks can be varied.

There's so much in this book, quilters will have difficulty deciding which of the designs to make and which blocks to include.

Note: Six books have been donated to the CQC library recently, so there are now 2,388 items in the CQC library. An online search tool makes it easy for members to find books and videos of interest. Grecia Cross Current Project Warm Hearts Block

Block Directions

This block finishes at 9" x 9" in the quilt. That means the block you submit should be 9½" x 9½". Make the background from cream or off-white fabric and the colorful portion of the block from a print or colored fabric that is the same within each block. A variety of print or colored fabrics may be used when making multiple blocks.

Cutting


Cream fabric:

- Cut two 3⅞" x 3⅞" squares*
- Cut four 2" x 3½" rectangles

Print/colored fabric:

- Cut two 3⅞" x 3⅞" squares*
- Cut four 2" x 3½" rectangles
- Cut one 3½" x 3½" square

*If you want to make oversized half-square triangles (HST), cut 4" squares. Make the HSTs as directed in Steps 1-5 then trim them to 3½" squares.



Assembly

Step 1: Draw a diagonal line on the wrong side of each cream 3⅞" square.

Step 2: Align the edges of a cream 3⅞" square and a print 3⅞" square right sides together.

Step 3: Stitch ¼" from the drawn diagonal line on both sides of the line.

Step 4: Cut on the drawn line. This will yield two HSTs. Repeat with the other set of 3⅞" squares.



Step 5: Press the four HSTs open, pressing toward the print fabric.



Step 6: Align the edges of a cream 2" x 3½" rectangle and a print 2" x 3½" rectangle right sides together.

Step 7: Stitch the rectangles together on one long side.

Step 8: Press the rectangles open, pressing toward the print fabric. Repeat to make four rectangle units.



Step 9: Sew a rectangle unit to each side of the print 3½" x 3½" square. The cream side of the rectangle unit should be next to the 3½" x 3½" square. Press toward the 3½" x 3½" square. This is the center row of the block.



Step 10: Sew a HST to each side of one of the remaining two rectangle units, placing the colored portion of the HST next to the rectangle unit. Press toward the HSTs. Repeat with the remaining rectangle unit and the two remaining HSTs. These will be the top and bottom rows of the block.



Step 11: Sew the top row of the block to the center row. The cream portion of the rectangle unit should be facing into the block next to the center square of the center row.

Step 12: Sew the bottom row of the block to the center row. The cream portion of the block should be facing into the block next to the center square of the center row.

The block is complete. It should measure 9½" x 9½".

If you'd like to piece your blocks into a quilt top, the size for Project Warm Hearts quilts is about 40" x 50".

Cindy Grisdela Speaks to CQC on the “Anatomy of Improv”

Cindy Grisdela dispelled the myth improv quilting is a fast process and showed how important color theory and principles of design are to creating the stunning quilts for which she is known during her presentation to CQC last month.

“It’s a misunderstanding that improv is quick,” Cindy said. “You have to be willing to wait for improv to tell you what it needs. I tend to work on more than one piece at a time so if I hit a block with one, I can work on the other. Sometimes you have to let a piece marinate.”

Cindy began as a traditional quilter.

“I got tired of following patterns so I moved into a more contemporary style,” she said. “I consider myself a contemporary quilter but I pay homage to traditional quilters.” One way she does this is by adding a fabric as though she’d run out of another.

Cindy works mostly in solids because they give a painterly quality. That said, she sometimes uses prints and batiks and showed how these can work with her techniques. Solids provide open areas where her quilting can shine.

“I spend a lot of time with my free-motion stitching, and I want it to show,” she said.

Cindy suggested starting improv quilts by selecting a color palette and showed examples of quilts made in monochromatic, analogous, complementary and “anything goes” (rainbow) colors.

One joy of improv quilting is seeing the quilt emerge as you work.

“A design wall is one of the most important tools for working improvisationally,” she said. “You can back away and see your work better.”

She encourages improv quilters to ask what-if questions. While critique from

others is valuable, the quilter’s own sense of what works is most important.

“You need to listen to your instincts,” she said. “Take the advice you get and think about it in your inner voice. Ask, ‘Is that what I really want?’”

Questions she raises as she works include: Is there balance? Is the focal point clear? Does repetition of shapes and colors draw the eye around the design? Is there variety in the colors and lines? Is the design too predictable or is there an element of surprise? She often takes black and white photos as she works toward answering these questions.

As an improv quilter, she often creates elements that don’t work in her current quilt, Cindy said. No problem. She saves them because they may be perfect for a future quilt.
